International Symposium: Traces and Atmospheres of Disasters

What is it like to feel a disaster, and how can the memory of those events be conveyed? This is a common object of investigation for two different epistemological traditions: the semiotics of traces and the new phenomenology of atmospheres. In keeping with Peirce's semiotic tradition, traces of a disastrous event can trigger the feeling and memory of it. It also raises the question nowadays of how memory might be transmitted when traces of the event are absent or have been manipulated. Abduction, the pre-logical inference which makes sense of traces, consciously or not, is at the heart of this reasoning.

A second philosophical tradition emerges to comprehend the atmosphere that emanates from a disaster, with similar questions regarding the possibility of crafting or manipulating these atmospheres. Establishing how an atmosphere was created faces the same difficulties as determining where it originated. At the heart of this aerial or vaporous feeling lies a process situated between the subject and their environment. Beyond the imprints and traces, what floats in the air of a disaster "through-rounding" us?

The ambition of this symposium is to articulate these two notions, traces and atmospheres, coming from distinct epistemological traditions, in discussion with the works of anthropologists, to improve our general understanding of what is occurring under the ill-fated stars.

Exhibition: Living Atmospheres

"Living Atmospheres" showcases important works by Season Lao that constitute an aesthetic meditation on atmosphere, vulnerability, and survival. Positioned in the historic chapel of Nîmes University's Hoche campus, the exhibition features paintings, site-specific installations, performances, and archival documents that explore how devastated landscapes, salvaged wood, mist, light, and silence can serve as the setting for living memory. Rather than considering disaster purely through the prism of loss, this exhibition suggests that places and beings exist in states of ongoing transformation. Through references to Japanese philosophy, the exhibition contends that atmosphere is not merely a backdrop but a shared conditions of existence and survival.

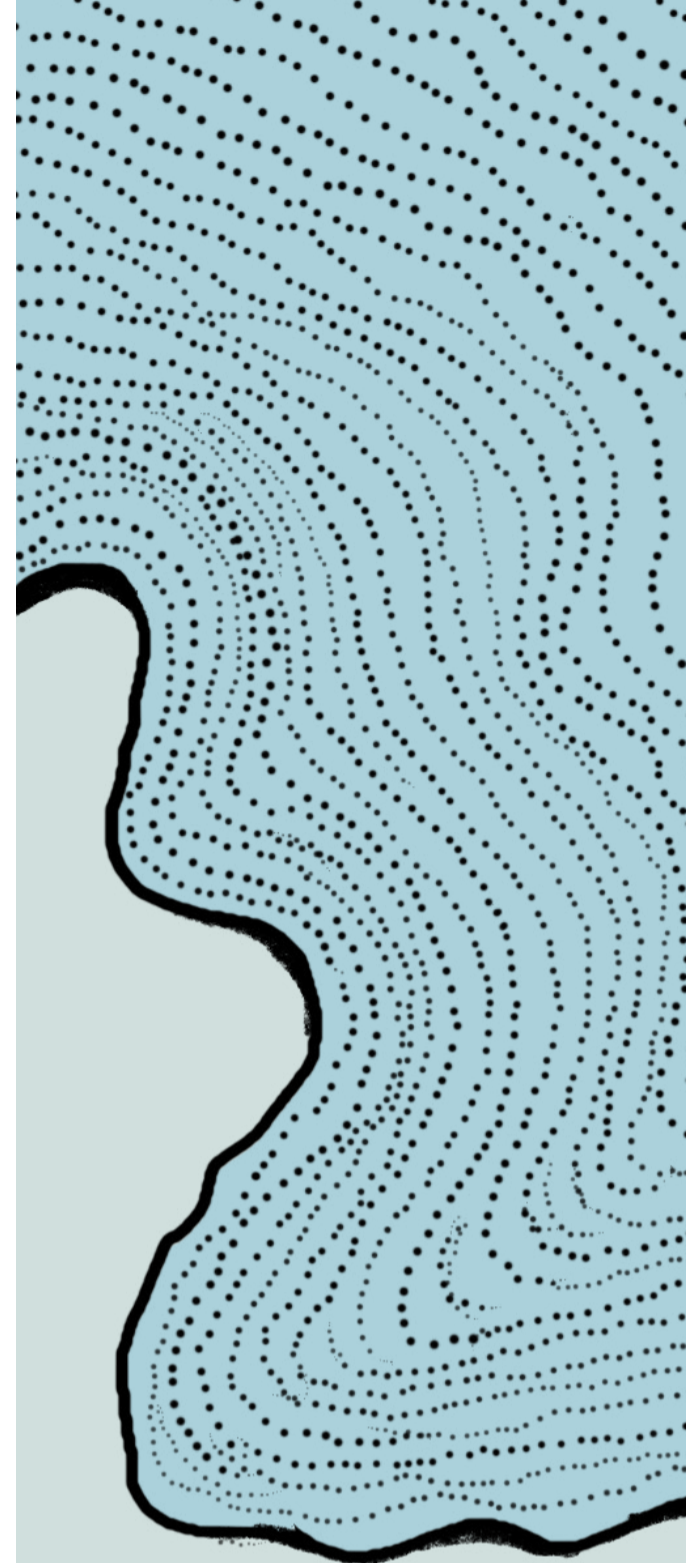
